Thinking Like a Network: Assistance to Randell Research Center and University of Florida During Fieldwork at Calusa Island

FPAN SW had been documenting erosion at Calusa Island for the past four years in conjunction with the HMS Florida program as well as a monitoring protocol established by Karen Walker of the University of Florida. The goal of these assessments is to document the rapid deterioration of the island caused by climate change.


In February, FPAN SW partnered with
